

Legal FAQ on Fair Housing Discrimination Suit Against Florida's SB 264

Understanding the Basics:

- Avoid Speculation: Speculating on details or outcomes of the lawsuit can be
 detrimental. Stick to facts and information you are certain about. If you're unsure about
 something, it's perfectly acceptable to say, "I'm not able to comment on that at this time."
 - Speculating about the defense's motives or actions could inadvertently lead to accusations of libel or slander. It's essential to remember that while we may have strong opinions about the defendant's conduct, it's crucial to express these opinions responsibly and within the bounds of factual accuracy.

Potential Questions for Consideration:

The below is directly related to any legal questions that may arise. We recommend you consult with your communications teams to tailor these suggested responses to fit your organization's key messages, tone and narrative, or recommend the reporter speak to your attorney regarding these questions.

- What are the legal challenges announced in the press release today?
 - We have filed a fair housing discrimination suit in federal court in Miami. The lawsuit challenges Florida's SB 264, a state law that significantly restricts property ownership for individuals from China, Russia, Iran, North Korea, Cuba, Venezuela, and Syria.
- What legal basis is the lawsuit founded upon?

The lawsuit asserts that SB 264 violates the federal Fair Housing Act, which
prohibits discrimination based on national origin. It argues that the law is rooted
in stereotyped and xenophobic generalizations and unfairly targets individuals
from specific countries.

What is the anticipated outcome of the lawsuit?

 We expect the court to find SB 264 in violation of the Fair Housing Act and strike it down. We believe the law is explicitly discriminatory and impedes the pursuit of homeownership for families from the affected countries who aspire to build a life free from discrimination in the United States.

Does SB 264 discriminate against individuals based on their immigration status?

SB 264 applies to individuals lawfully present in the United States, including those on various types of visas such as student visas, domestic employment visas, seasonal worker visas, and visas for victims of criminal activity and human trafficking. The law also applies to individuals outside the United States who seek to but property in Florida, such as international parents buying a home for a child in the United States.

What evidence supports the claim that SB 264 is motivated by xenophobia and discrimination?

The lawsuit asserts that SB 264 is based on stereotyped and xenophobic generalizations about individuals from the targeted countries. The sponsors' statements, including references to preventing individuals from "worming" their way into American society, are cited as evidence of discriminatory intent. SB 264 also has a significant disproportionate effect on people of certain ethnicities. People of Chinese, Russian, Iranian, North Korean, Cuban, Venezuelan, and Syrian descent face the restrictions of the law to a much greater degree than people from other countries.
